## Senior Companion & Foster Grandparent Programs

The Senior Companion and Foster Grandparent Programs are looking for a few great people to serve in their community and earn \$200 per month. Senior Companions help home-bound individuals with essential errands such as shopping and medical appointments. Foster

Grandparents serve in the local schools helping children who may be struggling with their school work. They are mentors, tutors, and friends to these children. To qualify for these programs you must be over 55 years old, and be willing to serve a minimum of 15 hours per

## Mosquito abatement

The City of Enterprise is looking for someone willing to serve on the Southwest Mosquito Abatement and Control Board. If this is something you are interested in doing, please contact us at (435) 878-2221 or come in to the offices for more information.

The southwest Mosquito Abatement and Control District has listed many ways to help protect you and your home from mosquitos:

Turn over or remove containers in your yard where water collects such as old tires, plant trays, buckets, and toys. Clean out birdbaths and wading pools at least once a week, and remove

standing water on tarps or flat roofs. Clean clogged rain gutters and downspouts. Clean and stock garden ponds with mosquito-eating fish or mosquito dunks. Recycle old bottles and cans. Repair leaky faucets and sprinklers. Keep swimming pools clean or drain them. Repair door and window screens if torn. Keep weeds and tall grass cut short; adult mosquitoes look for these shady places to rest during the



hot daylight hours. Get rid of mosquito breeding sites. (Electric "bug zappers" do not help since they usually attract more mosquitoes than they kill.) Keep window screens on campers, tents, and boats "bug-tight".

Why should you wear repellent with DEET? It is the most effective insect repellent available. It helps people reduce their exposure to mosquito bites that carry viruses such as West Nile virus. How does mosquito repellent work? Mosquitoes are attracted to people by skin odor and carbon dioxide from breath. DEET does not actually kill mosquitoes, it just makes them unable to detect us.

## Are You Prepared?

Winter storms create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frostbite, carbon monoxide poisoning, and heart attacks from overexertion. Winter storms and blizzards can bring extreme cold, freezing rain, snow, ice, and high winds. A winter storm can: last a few hours or several days; knock out heat, power, and communication services; and place older adults, young children, and sick individuals at greater risk.

Prepare now to stay safe when a winter storm threatens. Know your area's risk for winter storms. Pay attention to weather reports and warnings. Extreme winter

can leave communities without utilities for long periods of time.

Prepare for power outages. Gather supplies in case you need to stay home for several days without power. Keep in mind each person's specific needs, including medication. Don't forget the needs of pets. Have extra batteries for radios and flashlights. Use generators outside only, and away from windows.

Prepare your home with insulation, caulking, and weather stripping. Learn how to keep pipes from freezing. Install and test smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors with battery backups.

You may also come

across a winter storm while traveling. Be prepared by packing an emergency supply kit in your car. This should consist of jumper cables, flares, an ice scraper, a car cell phone charger, blankets, food, and water. Also, learn the signs of, and basic treatments for, frostbite and hypothermia.

If you are under a winter storm warning, find shelter right away. Stay off the roads. Stay indoors and dress warmly.
