As everyone knows there have been huge changes in our drought situation in just the last month. According to drought.utah.gov As of last month our area was in the moderate drought category and we have now moved up to the Abnormally Dry category, with the next level being no drought! It's hard to believe that this time last year we were just downgraded from the worst category of drought, and this year we are only one category away from no drought. This report was valid, March 21, 2023.

The current reservoir levels haven't been reported, but if you have been up to see the reservoirs, you know that the lower reservoir is going over the over-flow of the dam and the

upper reservoir is only a few feet from the top of the dam.

Southwest Utah has the highest snow water equivalent percentages of the entire state, sitting at 302% of the NRCS 1991-2020 median. Gutz Peak (behind the Upper Enterprise Reservoir) itself is at 600% of median.

The potential for flooding is clear. The City has prepared areas to fill sandbags around town in case any citizens need them to protect their homes.

There are four stations.

City Office Yard (400 South)

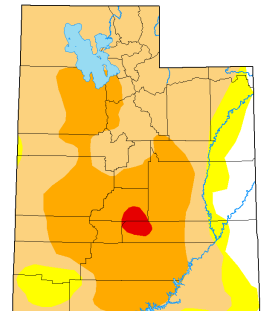
South of the Elementary School by the Pavilion (300 South)

North of Jim's Service (across

the wash on Center Street)

Next to the snow cone shack (about 50 East and Main Street)

There is sand, sandbags and cone filling stations for you to use to take what you need.

BURN PERMITS

Burning season is here.

Burn permits may be issued between March 1 and May 30 in Washington County. The county has requested a different approach to burn permits and asks that you call to report your burning and receive a burn permit from them. You can do

this by calling Dixie Dispatch at 435-627-4300. This helps them to know when someone is burning legally when receiving call-in reports of fires.

Please make sure to give them a call to

get a permit over the phone for the next time you plan to burn.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS-WATER STORAGE

Emergencies can cause a need for water. Your regular water source may not be available or may be compromised. You can be prepared by building a supply of water that will meet your family's needs during an emergency.

To determine your water needs, store at least one gallon of water per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation.

Individual needs may vary depending on age, health, physical condition, activity, diet and climate.

Children, nursing mothers and sick people may need more water.

Medical emergencies may require more water.

Warm weather climates may require more water and in very hot temperatures water needs can double.

If you have used all of your stored water, you can treat water that you do have access to by boiling, chlorination and distilling.

Enterprise Reservoir Dam



Enterprise City is a rural farming community located in Southwest Utah. The area raises some of the best hay, corn and kids. With several nearby lakes, boating and fishing opportunities are easy to find. Enterprise is the kind of place you like to call home and also like to come home to. The mountains also invite with their scenic beauty, atv and hiking trails, as well as some great hunting. At the end of August, Enterprise City hosts it's annual "Corn Fest", where the whole town turns out to celebrate small town life and the bounty that our local farmers produce.

Pioneer Settlers entered the area in the late 1800's and settled a few miles West of present day Hebron. Those industrious pioneers had a grand plan to build a large dam to help store a sizable amount of water for irrigating their crops during the dry summer season. This allowed them to irrigate far more land and to move farming into the broad valley East of Hebron. Soon a new townsite was plotted and most Hebron residents moved to present day Enterprise.
