CITY ORDINANCES FOR STREET PARKING AND BARROW PITS

There has been mention about safety on narrow roads in town and concerns of drainage. There are some things that we, as residents, can do to mitigate these concerns. The City of Enterprise had barrow pits designed for residents to help divert the flow of water for drainage. Many of these barrow pits have been filled in, against code. If it is desired for these barrow pits to be filled in, the necessary permits must be obtained and the work must be inspected.

As far as roads are concerned, parking just off the street must be parallel to the street and not encroaching on it. When vehicles are parked at a 45 or 90 degree angle to the street, they come closer to the street and drivers are forced to drive down the middle of the road to give themselves enough space for safety, trying not to hit parked cars and to be able to react quickly if animals or people were to come out into the street between said parked cars. We understand the convenience of parking this way allows for more vehicles to be parked at your home, however, this causes a ripple effect in other areas.

The aforementioned ordinances are sited below.

12-08-035 Barrow Pits

A. All barrow pits within the City of Enterprise shall remain at the grade and design established by the City of Enterprise and shall at no time be altered, diverted, filled, or obstructed in any manner without the approval and inspection by the City street department. Any alteration, including the filling or surfacing, installation of culvert, valley gutter or like device is prohibited unless the property owner applies for the necessary permit at the City Offices, and submits the appropriate plans and designs for approval. Installation shall be to design specifications and shall be inspected by the City. Property owners who alter barrow pits do so at their own peril, meaning that the City may at any time remove such culverts, valley gutters, etc. when it becomes necessary for the public good. The City shall not bear any expense for replacing such devices.

B. Violations of this section will be punished as a misdemeanor under the provisions of Section 12-08-010 (C) of this chapter. (Ord. 12.08.11.94 \$1, 1994)

12-08-010 Obstruction Prohibited—Penalty

A. It is unlawful for any person, without the consent of the City Council as hereinafter provided for, to cause any encroachment or obstruction upon any street, alley or sidewalk of this City, which hinders the free travel of pedestrians, teams, automobiles, or other traffic along the streets or sidewalks or which obstructs the view along the same.

Most may know, but volunteers are hard to find these days especially volunteers who are in it for the long run.

Enterprise Ambulance has been a volunteer service since inception. Our volunteers play such an important role in the service that we provide our patients. Without the many volunteers throughout the years, the Enterprise Ambulance Service would not be what it is.

Volunteering on an ambulance is not your typical volunteer position. Every volunteer must spend 160 class time hours over several months (aside from personal study and skill practice) ending with the dreaded National Registry Exam which has only a 67% pass-rate for first time test takers. After that, to become an Advanced EMT, they must put in 134 class time hours over another several months (aside from personal study and skill practice), only to be met with the National Registry exam again.

After becoming a certified EMT or AEMT, these volunteers must attend trainings monthly for a total of 40 hours to keep up their education and skill set.

After the many hours of training, Volunteer EMT's are on call each week for regularly scheduled shifts, including at least 1 weekend a month. They must be able to respond to the ambulance bay at a moment's notice to help when the need arises. This can be during church, family functions or sleep, but regardless of the moment, we've been able to count on our amazing volunteers to be there!

Marlee Walch (AEMT) has volunteered on the Enterprise ambulance for the past 17 years. Her knowledge and fearlessness has been such an asset. Marlee has always been great at being a preceptor to less experienced EMTs on calls, helping them to get the experience they need to be successful, and confident EMTs. Marlee is not

afraid to get in the action and get her hands dirty. Although Marlee no longer takes a regular shift on the ambulance, she still helps by substituting when other EMT's need coverage for their shifts.

Curtis and Melinda Rupp (both AEMT's) have volunteered on the ambulance for the past 15 years and have just recently retired from the ambulance service. Melinda has helped multiple babies be born, and has brought special skills and knowledge to the table with her experience in the medical field. Melinda also served as a captain on the department. Curtis' experience with the Fire Department has been an asset on car accidents, and he is also well known for having some of the fastest transports for patients to St. George Regional Hospital. Curtis also covered many shifts on the ambulance carrying a lot of weight for the agency. Both Curtis and Melinda have a long history of volun-

teerism in many aspects of our community, and are usually the first to offer help.

These volunteers have been such an asset to the Enterprise Ambulance Service and are so appreciated for their service and sacrifice for their community. They will be missed and we hope their new chapter is good to them.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS/ELECTRICAL SAFETY

We rely on electricity every day, but electricity can be dangerous, especially if misused. Electrical malfunction is a leading cause of home fires year after year. Here are some tips to reduce accidents and fires.

-Electrical work should only be done by a qualified electrician.

-Check your electrical cord. If they are cracked or damaged, replace them, don't try and repair them.

-Don't overload extension cords or wall outlets.

-Never use extension cords with appliances. Plug them directly into wall outlets.

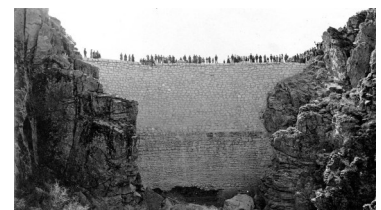
-Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage.

-Unplug small appliances when not in use.

-Keep lamps, light fixtures, and light bulbs away from anything that can burn.

Enterprise City is a rural farming community located in Southwest Utah. The area raises some of the best hay, corn and kids. With several nearby lakes, boating and fishing opportunities are easy to find. Enterprise is the kind of place you like to call home and also like to come home to. The mountains also invite with their scenic beauty, atv and hiking trails, as well as some great hunting. At the end of August, Enterprise City hosts it's annual "Corn Fest", where the whole town turns out to celebrate small town life and the bounty that our local farmers produce.

Pioneer Settlers entered the area in the late 1800's and settled a few miles West of present day Hebron. Those industrious pioneers had a grand plan to build a large dam to help store a sizable amount of water for irrigating their crops during the dry summer season. This allowed them to irrigate far more land and to move farming into the broad valley East of Hebron. Soon a new townsite was plotted and most Hebron residents moved to present day Enterprise.



Enterprise Reservoir Dam
