There will be no lifeguard on duty, so please make sure to supervise your children while recreating in the pond. There is a buoy line by the beach side of the pond that has more shallow water. The pond was stocked with trout on Wednesday, June 28th with more fish on the way. To legally fish the pond, you will need to have a fishing license and only fish the limits set by the Utah DWR. The DWR Fishing Guidebook can be viewed at wildlife.utah.gov. There is also in additional information or special requests. When you receive your entry number, make sure to post it on both sides of your entry, close to the front and large enough for the announcers to see the numbers clearly.

Parade participants will line up prior to the parade at 8:30 am. The parade will go west on Main Street, starting at 400 East and ending at 200 West. Parade Participants will be assigned numbers and be directed to line up on Diagonal Street or 400 East.

DUMP SITE ISSUES

We are beginning to see problems at the dump site again. The biggest problem we are seeing now, is that the small dumpsters on the West side of the dump-site are being filled with larger items, possibly from garage cleanouts and yard cleanups. Larger items MUST go into the bulky item dumpsters on the North and South side of the dump-site and natural materials like tree branches, limbs, leaves and bush clippings must go into the burn pile. Only household trash may go into the small West side dumpsters.

We all recognize that the dump-site can get full very quickly and following these rules help to keep more dumping space for everyone in town.

FIREWORKS SAFETY

The NSC offered a few fireworks safety tips for your celebrations this year. Be sure to follow these tips for a Safe Independence Day Holiday.

-Never allow young children to handle fireworks.

-Older children should only use them under close adult supervision.

-Never use fireworks while impaired by drugs or alcohol.

-Anyone using fireworks or

standing nearby should wear protective eyewear.

-Never hold lighted fireworks in your hands.

-Never light them indoors.

-Only use them away from people, houses, and flammable material.

-Never point or throw fireworks at another person.

-Only light one device at a time and maintain a safe distance after lighting.

-Never ignite devices in a

container.

-Do not try to re-light or handle malfunctioning fireworks.

-Soak both spent and unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding.

-Keep a bucket of water nearby to fully extinguish fireworks that don't go off or in case of fire.

-Never use illegal fireworks. Enterprise City is a rural farming community located in Southwest Utah. The area raises some of the best hay, corn and kids. With several nearby lakes, boating and fishing opportunities are easy to find. Enterprise is the kind of place you like to call home and also like to come home to. The mountains also invite with their scenic beauty, atv and hiking trails, as well as some great hunting. At the end of August, Enterprise City hosts it's annual "Corn Fest", where the whole town turns out to celebrate small town life and the bounty that our local farmers produce.

Pioneer Settlers entered the area in the late 1800's and settled a few miles West of present day Hebron. Those industrious pioneers had a grand plan to build a large dam to help store a sizable amount of water for irrigating their crops during the dry summer season. This allowed them to irrigate far more land and to move farming into the broad valley East of Hebron. Soon a new townsite was plotted and most Hebron residents moved to present day Enterprise.
